

Electoral registration form for someone with no fixed or permanent address

You can still register to vote even if you do not have a fixed address. This could be because:

- you are homeless or have no fixed address
- you are under 18 and are/or have been a child looked after by a local authority or are being kept in secure accommodations
- you are a patient in a mental health hospital
- you are a person who has been remanded in custody, but you have not yet been convicted of an offence.

To register, you need to give an address where you would be living if it were not for your current situation, or an address where you have lived in the past. If you are homeless, you can give details of where you spend a substantial part of your time.

How to register to vote

- 1 Fill in this electoral registration form.
- 2 Make sure you sign the declaration.
- 3 Return your completed form to us at the address shown above.
- 4 Problems with the form? Contact your electoral registration office if you need any help understanding or completing this form – or if you need this form in large print or in another format.

Register to vote as soon as you can, or it may be too late to vote in the next election.

Registering to vote

You can register to vote if you are:

- Resident (usually live) in Wales and aged 14 or over (but you will not be able to vote in local council elections (before May 2022) or Senedd elections until you are 16. You will not be able to vote in UK Parliamentary or Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) elections until you are 18).

You must also be either:

- A British or Irish citizen, or
- A Commonwealth citizen who has leave to enter or remain in the UK or who does not require such leave, or
- A foreign national who has leave to enter or remain in the UK or who does not require such leave (you can vote in Senedd and local council elections only), or
- A European Union citizen (you can vote in Senedd, local council and PCC elections only).

All information requested in this form must be provided (unless stated otherwise) or your application may be delayed.

Your nationality

You can register to vote in the UK if you are a British (including English, Scottish, Welsh or from Northern Ireland), Irish or European Union citizen, or a Commonwealth citizen or foreign citizen who has leave to enter or remain in the UK or does not require such leave. We may need additional evidence about your nationality or we may check your nationality or immigration status against government records. If you have more than one nationality, please include them all.

Your date of birth

If you don't know your date of birth please give the date you put on official documents (for example, your passport or driving licence) or tick one of the boxes. Your date of birth identifies you, confirms your eligibility to vote and can be used to call you for jury service.

Changed your name?

For example, you may have got married and changed your name. You do not have to give us details of your name change but it will help us identify you. If this information is not given then you may need to provide additional documentary evidence.

The open register

There are two registers. Why?

Using information received from the public, registration officers keep two registers – the electoral register and the open register (also known as the edited register).

The electoral register lists the names and addresses of everyone who is registered to vote in public elections.

The register is used for electoral purposes, such as making sure only eligible people can vote. It is also used for other limited purposes specified in law, such as:

- detecting crime (e.g. fraud)
- calling people for jury service
- checking credit applications.

The open register is an extract of the electoral register, but is not used for elections. It can be bought by any person, company or organisation. For example, it is used by businesses and charities to confirm name and address details. If you are aged 16 or over your name and address will be included in the open register unless you ask for them to be removed. Removing your details from the open register does not affect your right to vote.

If you are aged 14 or 15, you will not be included on the open register.

You will be included on the electoral register, but only Electoral Registration Officers and their staff can usually see the details you provide. Your details will not be included in any register that is published.

About six weeks before an election certain people need details of everyone who can vote in that election. If you will be 16 on the date of the Senedd or local council elections, your name and address will be given to people who run the elections, and to candidates who want to provide information to voters.

If you are concerned that having your name or address on the register may affect your safety, there could be other options available to you.

In certain circumstances, you can register without your name and address showing on the register.

Privacy statement

We collect information under the legal basis of a task carried out in the public interest, as set out in the Representation of the People Act 1983, the Senedd and Elections (Wales) Act 2020 and related regulations. We will look after personal information securely and follow data protection legislation.

If you opted-out of the open register we will only use the information you give us for electoral purposes, including matching it against other sources of data to support the electoral register. We will not give personal information to anyone else, unless we have to by law. The law requires us to share your information with candidates, political parties and campaigners for democratic engagement purposes and credit reference agencies to check your identity when you apply for credit.

If you have not opted-out of the open register your name and address can be bought by anyone and used for lots of purposes, including direct marketing.
